The White House & President's Park

"White House of the Confederacy: an Illustrated History brings together photographs, many published here for the first time, that tell the story of a grand edifice, one that has been significant not only in Richmond's history, but in Southern history as well. Built in 1818 by John Brockenbrough, the mansion at Twelfth and Clay streets was home to some of Richmond's leading citizens. The building was thrust into prominence in 1861 when the city of Richmond purchased it to be used as the executive mansion

for Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America. For nearly four years the White House of the Cnfederacy was a political and social center, as well as a family home. With the collapse of the Confederacy in April 1865, the bulding became headquarters for the United States army that occupied Richmond. In November 1870 the finance committee of the Richmond city council decided to auction the contents of the Davis Mansion and convert the bulding into a public school. Auctioneer Wellington Goddin's advertisement in the local newspapers boasted that the 'location and neighborhood are equal to the best in Richmond, and by renown of its commanding eminence, the view from it is most lovely.' After twenty years as a school the building had lost most of its luster and the city council condemned it to destruction. Fortunately, an organization of Richmond women lobbied successfully to save the structure and turned it into a museum for 'relics' of the Confederacy. Saved as a shrine of the Confederate 'Lost Cause,' the mansion has in recent years been restored to the beauty and magnificence of its heyday, the time when its occupant was Jefferson Davis. These handsome photographs chronicle the history of the White House of the Confederacy, the people associated with it, and the building's rebirth as a historic home of national significance." -- From publisher's description.

Designing History

The Presidents and the Pastime draws on Curt Smith's extensive background as a former White House presidential speechwriter to chronicle the historic relationship between baseball, the "most American" sport, and the U.S. presidency. Smith, who USA TODAY calls "America's voice of authority on baseball broadcasting," starts before America's birth, when would-be presidents played baseball antecedents. He charts how baseball cemented its reputation as America's pastime in the nineteenth century, such presidents as Lincoln and Johnson playing town ball or giving employees time off to watch. Smith tracks every U.S. president from Theodore Roosevelt to Donald Trump, each chapter filled with anecdotes: Wilson buoyed by baseball after suffering disability; a heroic FDR saving baseball in World War II; Carter, taught the game by his mother, Lillian; Reagan, airing baseball on radio that he never saw--by "re-creation." George H. W. Bush, for whom Smith wrote, explains, "Baseball has everything." Smith, having interviewed a majority of presidents since Richard Nixon, shares personal stories on each.

Throughout, *The Presidents and the Pastime* provides a riveting narrative of how America's leaders have treated baseball. From Taft as the first president to throw the "first pitch" on Opening Day in 1910 to Obama's "Go Sox!" scrawled in the guest register at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2014, our presidents have deemed it the quintessentially American sport, enriching both their office and the nation.
